Message from the President



On behalf of the entire Membership, I wish to congratulate the newly elected officers of the Society, and warmly thank all our colleagues who agreed to run for the various positions. Serving the Society as one of its Officers is time-consuming. We are all very grateful to all candidates for their interest in furthering the cause of the Society despite their busy professional schedules.

ISHC Membership

Stan Lang, the Society's treasurer, reported at the meeting that as of July 2005 the Society counts 664 members and 5 Fellows. Eighty colleagues did not renew their membership in 2005. This report engendered much discussion on

how membership can be increased. We still have a substantial number of members, but considering the enormous volume of research in heterocyclic chemistry being done worldwide, we believe the Society should have even more. We feel it is important that we try to increase our membership, and this means actively recruiting new heterocyclic chemists in the years to come. You can help!! Please advertise our Society to your colleagues and collaborators present and past, explain to them that membership in the ISHC has important advantages, several of which are outlined below, and encourage them to join our ranks.

Membership would be particularly advantageous for those who are planning to attend the Sydney Congress in 2007. Furthermore, graduate student membership is quite inexpensive. Encouraging your students to join is a good way to recruit the next generation of heterocyclic chemists into the Society.

Some Benefits Associated with Membership in the ISHC

1. Participation in the Congress at significantly reduced registration rates.
2. Obtain Congress abstracts of papers at no cost even if not in attendance.
3. Receive Lectures in Heterocyclic Chemistry (complete plenary lectures of the biannual ICHC Congresses).
4. Subscribe to Heterocycles at 20% discount.
5. Receive 25% discount from Elsevier on many different books.
6. Free annual copy of Progress in Heterocyclic Chemistry (see below)

Society Finances and Membership Dues

The financial condition of the Society is reasonably solid, thanks also to the increase in membership dues imposed in 2003 (the first such increase in seven years). No further increase will be necessary in the coming year. The 2005 membership dues will thus remain at US \$ 45.00 for regular members and US \$ 20.00 for student members. We will try to hold dues at this level for as long as possible.

Based of the current rates of exchange (1 US Dollar = 0.8554 European Euro = 118.1 Japanese Yen), ISHC dues in the three currencies are as follows:

<i>Regular Member</i>	<i>Student Member</i>
• US \$ 45.00	• US \$ 20.00
• Euro 38.50	• Euro 17.00
• Yen 5,315.00	• Yen 2,362.00

Since the dues for student members are less than half of the regular dues, student membership does not include the free annual copy of *Progress in Heterocyclic Chemistry*. However, student members are entitled to the other benefits associated with membership (see above).

For long-standing members of 10 years of continuous membership, there is the opportunity to become a Life Member of the Society: the dues for life membership are 10-times the current annual dues. An individual must apply for this status, and the application must be approved by the Executive Committee. This honor is generally reserved for individuals who have made key or long standing contributions to the Society.

Of course, ISHC Life Members, as well as Fellows, receive the free annual copy of *Progress in Heterocyclic Chemistry*.

Please be advised that in the recent past we have experienced some difficulties with Members who submitted their ISHC dues to our European Officer either in US Dollars or by credit card. Remittances in *US Dollars*, as well as all credit card payments, should be forwarded to Dr. Stan Lang.

Hundreds of heterocyclic chemists are doing active research in Russia, but currency exchange/transfer problems may interfere with their ability to join the Society. Our Russian Members may pay their dues in Rubles, equivalent to US \$22.50 (active member) or US \$ 10.00 (certified predoctoral student member). 
